Pastor's Corner...

Dear King of Glory family and friends,

June was quite the busy and bittersweet month for us, wasn't it? We had to say goodbye to two more of our beloved members as they joined the company of all the saints, but we also got to welcome 10 more new members into our little corner of Christ's Kingdom. Additionally, we had such a wonderful Unity Service and Summer Kick-off BBQ on Father's Day, and we got to bless our high school graduates and commission our youth for their trip to the National Youth Gathering in Houston, Texas.

Looking ahead to July, the busy and the sweet continues (but hopefully we will be leaving the bitter behind). This month we are exploring the ELCA's new draft social statement on "Women and Justice" by first exploring together the original study titled "Faith, Sexism and Justice." Now, I know right off the bat, these words make some of you uncomfortable, but there are several reasons why it's important for us to discuss these topics together.

1. We are reminded in the Bible that issues of justice are always close to God's heart. How the less powerful in society are treated by the more powerful is often cited as proof for how near or far people are from God. And Jesus himself often spoke about issues of social and economic justice, teaching that how we love our neighbors is directly related to how we love God.
2. No matter what your media source is, there are nonpartisan undeniable statistics that indicate that women are often oppressed, abused and undervalued in our society.
3. Finally, my motivation for us in tackling this study goes far beyond this particular topic. Our society has lost its ability to communicate. It has lost its ability to listen, to discuss, and to disagree respectfully when it comes to controversial topics. It has lost its civility and empathy. If we in the church, the Body of Christ, cannot have peaceful discussions where we listen honestly and openly to one another's challenging and competing perspectives, then our culture is doomed. This is our chance to practice and relearn how to truly listen to and love one another and Be Church Together!

Please consider joining me and joining your fellow church members in this important study. I will be hosting a discussion between our Sunday services from 9:30-10:15 (childcare available with prior notice) and on Wednesday afternoons from 1:30-3:00 starting Sunday, July 15 and Wednesday, July 18. All are welcome. If you'd like to start reading the study on your own before we begin meeting, it can be downloaded by going to the ELCA's resource page at www.elca.org/Resources and searching "Faith, Sexism and Justice."

The other thing I wanted to remind you of is our "Faith and Film" summer sermon series which will be starting Sunday, July 15. After all your votes came in (almost 100 of you turned in ballots!), the following films rose to the top and will be discussed on the Sundays listed below. And as before, please know that there is no requirement for you to see these movies before the sermon. I try to preach the message in such a way that you will take away something whether or not you have viewed the film. Also, you may notice the last Sunday has a bit of a cinematic surprise that I expect everyone has seen at some point in their life. It wasn't on our original list; it was a "write in" vote from one of our members, and I thought it would be a fun final film to discuss the Sunday we have our fall Back-to-School Kick-off and Backpack Blessing. PACIFICA SYNOD 2018 RECAP

From our KOG delegates

The 31st Annual Pacifica Synod Assembly was held on the campus of Hope Lutheran Church in Palm Desert. It was nice to hold the assembly at a church instead of a hotel as in the past.

The theme was "Go & Tell: Giving Voice to Faith, Justice & Blessing" and the sessions were led by Bishop Andy Taylor. In addition, Bill Horne the ELCA Vice President was there as a Churchwide Representative.

The assembly was a great mix of business, stories, celebration, and worship. The business part included reports, elections, resolutions, memorials and budgets. The reports, budgets and elections were peppered into the assembly -- brief and to the point. The resolutions and memorials were studied more deeply and garnered lively and insightful discussion.

We also got to hear many stories from about a dozen speakers. They shared how God and peers worked through them, giving voice to faith, justice and blessing in their lives and ministry. Their stories were heartfelt and moving reflections of the growing diversity of the ELCA and how far we have come -- and how much more work there is to be done.

We celebrated 2 pastors that had 25 years of service and one pastor with 50 years of service. We also celebrated numerous grants and scholarships, which included grants to King of Glory's Preschool and King's Kitchen.

Assembly actions included voting on elections, resolutions and memorials. Discussions from the floor were encouraged. Our own Pastor Kinndlee Lund helped present on the ELCA's Draft Social Statement titled "Women and Justice." We will have the honor of being part of this study this summer. In the elections, our own Gerry Marecek was elected as Council Lay at Large. Gary Kakert continues to serve as Treasurer of the Synod Council. All the actions are available on-line, or a paper copy can be made available to you.

It is such a blessing to be involved in and with the ELCA. We ARE church together for the sake of the world!

EXCERPTS FROM THE PACIFICA SYNOD SUMMARY
31st Annual Synod Assembly—May 18-19, 2018—Hope Lutheran, Palm Desert

Continuing a “tradition” that began last year, storytellers were once again a part of this assembly. Storytellers universally told of coming to the Lutheran faith through family members or through their own journey from a judgmental God to a loving one found through grace. We heard from a wide variety of experiences and cultures.

A unique activity of this assembly was an extended time of the entire assembly sharing stories with each other of where they had seen God that week and when they had prayed for another or when someone had prayed for them. These conversations taught us much about sharing our faith in simple, friendly conversations.

BISHOP ANDY TAYLOR opened the 31st Annual Pacifica Synod Assembly with a call for us to share our stories of God working in the world through faith, justice and blessing. On Saturday, Bishop Taylor’s report was focused around the Bible story of the widow who gave Elijah all the meal and oil she had to make one last cake, and her generosity and trust in God allowed God to do a miracle where her meal and oil did not run out. We considered how God might work in our ministries if we trust and share. Bishop Taylor called for justice in our immigration policies, particularly around children being separated from their parents as they cross the border.



SPEAKERS

Pastor Hyunho Hong (Church of Dream Builders, Anaheim and St. Luke’s, Fullerton) shared about his unique ministry which includes teaching Korean children Spanish. He talked about his own realization that in time of trouble, he had not prayed. Once he realized God was answering prayers, although not necessarily in the way Pastor Hyunho imagined, his faith deepened.

Pastors Cate Luehr (below, right, Emanuel, La Habra) and Sarah Sumner-Eisenbraun (below, left, St. Andrew’s, San Diego) celebrated their similarities and differences as pastors and Christians and considered how blessings flow to and through us.



GARY KAKERT, SYNOD COUNCIL TREASURER, and member of King of Glory Lutheran Church, Fountain Valley, gave his report to the assembly which was received unanimously.



Pastors Gloria Espeseth (retired), Julie Kelly (Hope, Riverside) and Kinndlee Lund (King of Glory, Fountain Valley) introduced the Assembly to the ELCA Draft Social Statement on Women & Justice, encouraging members to bring the information back to their congregations.

Synod Assembly actions included

- Accepting the 2019/2020 budget

- Increasing base wage for pastors by 2.5%

- Urging all congregations and members to study the ELCA's Draft Social Statement on Women and Justice and send their comments to the Task Force on Women and Justice before September 30, 2018. An overview of the draft statement follows.

Overview of the 'Draft Social Statement on Women and Justice'

The ELCA Task Force on *Women and Justice: One in Christ* has written this draft as a crucial step toward the development of a social statement that will be considered by the 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly.

Draft social statements have no official standing as statements of the ELCA. They are a means to invite everyone to participate in the process toward the creation of an official statement. ELCA social statements are theological and teaching documents. They assist the ELCA and its members to reach informed judgments on social issues from a perspective of faith. They are intended to cultivate individual and community discernment, as well as to guide moral formation. They govern this church's institutional policy and teaching in its social witness and guide its work as a public church. Social statements are developed through an extensive process of deliberation involving the whole church and are adopted by a two-thirds majority of an ELCA churchwide assembly. The heart of this social statement draft is expressed in the first nine pages (2,800 words), and the task force hopes everyone will take the time to read them. The task force also wishes to receive comments and feedback from every reader so that our church is engaged in a broad discussion of these timely themes and commitments. (The feedback form is online and also at the end of the draft booklet. Both are available at ELCA.org/womenandjustice.)

The draft begins with and is rooted in our common foundation, a confession of faith in the Triune God. From this certainty of faith flow 36 assertions, divided into five sections. These assertions claim God's intention of abundant life for all, confess sexism and patriarchy as sin, name the resources of Lutheran faith to address this sin, and articulate this church's work and its call to reli-

gious and secular partners. The draft closes with an expression of hope for justice, grounded in trust in God's promise of grace. Each of the 36 assertions (thesis statements) is explained in the "Fuller Explanation," which makes up the rest of this draft. Here every assertion is explained, often with supporting citations.

I. Core Convictions

The Scriptures show God's intention is abundant life for all in this diverse creation and God's care in creating humans in the image of God.

However, patriarchy and sexism prevent abundant life for all and deny—in practice—that all humans are created in the image of God. Sexism and patriarchy are therefore sinful. As Christians we understand that God's grace justifies us and turns us to serve others through neighbor justice, including gender justice.

II. Analysis of Patriarchy and Sexism

Patriarchy is a social system in which everyone consciously and subconsciously participates, and it benefits men and boys at the expense of women and girls and gender non-conforming individuals. Sexism is the support of male privilege. This does not mean women are good and men are bad. Both church and society and the individuals within them contribute to patriarchy and sexism.

III. Resources for Resisting Patriarchy and Sexism

Although the Christian church and the ELCA as one member of Christ's body are guilty of participating in the forces of patriarchy and sexism, there are a number of resources in the faith tradition to foster gender justice. Scriptural witness to God's desire for justice elucidates principles for our church in its work toward equity.

These include: sufficiency, sustainability, solidarity, and participation. Likewise, Lutheran biblical interpretation and interpretations of doctrines are faithful resources to respond to the sins of patriarchy and sexism; interpretation and doctrine should be evangelical and serve all people, no matter their gender. Empowered by God's justifying grace received through faith, our church sees its calling to foster secular ideas, religious beliefs, and laws, policies, and practices that support abundant life for all.

IV. Response to God's Work and Our Call to Action and New Commitments in Society

This section of the draft outlines some of the commitments the ELCA should make in society to create gender-based equality and equity. Subjects range from human rights to violence to the media to health care to economics to immigration and migration to families, communities, caregiving, and stereotypes to public leadership.

V. Response to God's Work and Call to Action and New Commitments Regarding the Church

This section of the draft outlines some of the commitments our church should make within its own life toward greater gender-based equality and equity. Subjects range from church leadership and authority to scriptural translation and interpretation to the Lutheran theological tradition to language for God to economics to ecumenical, inter-faith, and secular dialogues and partnerships
